 He had intended to meet me, but we could not meet because he fell ill.
- 9. **Boss** to supervise, to dominate, tend to instruct irritatingly I wish you would stop **bossing** me around.
- Potter about move about aimlessly doing some unimportant things
 I was perfectly happy just pottering about and doing silly little jobs in my flat.
- Irritated made somebody angry, annoyed
 I get really irritated when he keeps repeating himself.
- 12. Loll sit or stand, lazily The teacher told the students not to loll around and to begin their assignment quickly.
- 13. Messing about spending time doing things that are not important, without any particular purpose or plan
 The young man was just messing about the room and not doing any work.
- Slaving working very hard at something
 After slaving for hours I managed to finish all my homework.
- 15. **Superintend** be responsible for the management or arrangement Sunil's wife **superintended** the huge party at his home.
- 16. Energetic full of energyHe was feeling energetic early in the morning.
- 17. Strapped tied with strapsMy bag was strapped so that it would not open.
- 18. **Senseless** with no good or useful purpose Sharing your ATM PIN with that man was a **senseless** thing to do.
- 19. Make me so wild make me very angryHis habit of clearing his throat continuously, makes me so wild.
- 20. Haunts to repeatedly give troubleThat ache in my knee haunts me continuously during winter.



21. **Misery** – great unhappiness

I could not bear to see the **misery** of the poor homeless people sleeping on the pavement in winter.

22. **Perspiration** – a salty watery waste product that leaves the body through the skin

People have a lot of **perspiration** during the summer season.

23. **Every mortal thing** – every living thing; though, in the story, it has been used by the author to mean everything

Every mortal thing must be treated with the same respect.

24. Rummaged – searched

Naresh **rummaged** through his bag, but he could not find the key of the locker.

25. **Chaos** – a state of total confusion with no order

There was total **chaos** in the house when my mother fell sick.

26. **Reigned** – ruled over

Emperor Ashoka **reigned** over a large part of India thousands of years ago.

27. **Slammed** – made something shut very loudly

He **slammed** the book down angrily on the table.

28. **Tobacco pouch** – a small bag that holds tobacco, which is used for smoking

He took out his **tobacco pouch** and filled his pipe with tobacco.

29. **Hamper** – large basket for carrying food

The picnic **hamper** contained a lot of delicious food like cakes, parathas and sweets.

30. **Exception** – someone or something that is not included in a rule, group, or list

I like all kinds of music with the **exception** of loud Hindi film music.

31. **Squashed** – to crush something into a flat shape

Bruno, the dog, sat on the cake and **squashed** it.

32. **Trod on** – stepped on

She **trod on** the phone by mistake and broke it.

33. **Nervous** – worried and anxious

Sunita was very **nervous** about her board exams.



34. **Upset** – to push or knock something out of its usual position, usually by accident, especially causing it to fall While setting the dish down on the table, she **upset** the glass of water.

35. **Kettle** – a container for boiling water that has a lid, handle, and spout and is made of metal.

She put the **kettle** on the fire for boiling water for tea.

36. **Scrape** – to remove an unwanted covering or a top layer from something using a sharp edge or something rough
Before we paint the chair we have to **scrape** away the old paint on it.

- 37. **Oath** a promise, especially that you will tell the truth in a law court Before starting the Olympic Games, all the athletes have to take an **oath** that they will take part in the games fairly.
- 38. **Extraordinary** very unusual, special, unexpected or strange He told us the **extraordinary** story of how he sailed across the world all alone.
- 39. **Mysterious** strange, not known, or not understood
 A **mysterious** man suddenly came out of the bushes and wanted to talk to us.
- 40. **Indignantly** angrily

When my mother saw the mess in my room, she shook her head **indignantly**.

41. **Spinning round** – to quickly turn your own or someone else's body to face in the opposite direction

Spinning round, the thief, quickly left the room when he saw my mother enter it.

42. **Roared** – made a long, loud, deep sound
The animal **roared** in anger and pain when it was hit by a bullet.

- 43. **Be sworn at** to utter a curse or use abusive language I was very angry when I was sworn at by the drunk man.
- 44. **Squirm** to wriggle When I held the baby, she **squirmed** constantly.
- 45. **Particularly** especially, or more than usual I didn't **particularly** want to go to the party, but my mother forced me to go.



46. **Nuisance** – something or someone that annoys you or causes trouble for you

The noise from the wedding party was a **nuisance** and we could not sleep.

47. **Stumble** – to step awkwardly while walking or running and fall or about to fall

Please make sure that you do not **stumble**, as the path is very uneven here.

48. **Curse** – to say rude words about something or someone because you are angry

I asked the man not to **curse** the dog needlessly as it was not its fault.

- 49. **Accomplishing** fulfilling or achieving something We should work hard to **accomplish** our goals.
- 50. Conceit pride in oneselfIt was her conceit that stopped her from admitting that she was wrong.
- 51. **Unbearable** too painful or unpleasant for you to continue to experience The pain was so **unbearable** that I started screaming loudly.
- 52. **Laboured** did something with a lot of effort She **laboured** up the hill with the heavy bags.
- 53. **Fixed belief** strong, unshakeable feeling of being certain that something exists or is true

He had a **fixed belief** that if he prayed everyday, God would make him pass the exam.

54. **Worried** – disturbed

My niece worried the happy baby and he started crying loudly.

- 55. **Pretended** behaved as if something is true when you knew it was not, especially in order to deceive people or as a game

 The child **pretended** that he was a lion on the prowl in the jungle.
- 56. **Encouraged** made someone more likely to do something, or made something more likely to happen

 We were **encouraged** to solve the problem on our own.
- 57. Reflection thinking deeply about something.On reflection of my behaviour, I felt that I had made a lot of mistakes.



- 58. **Comfort** to make someone feel better when they are sad or worried I tried to **comfort** the child, but he continued crying for his mother.
- 59. **Tossed** to throw something, here to throw a coin in the air and guess which side will land face up; used to make decisions

 The umpire **tossed** the coin to decide which team would bat first.
- 60. Row –fight or a quarrel.
 Sunil got into a row with his boss, because he was late getting to work every day.
- 61. **Split the difference** to agree on a midway point between two points, in this case 6.30 because it was halfway between six and seven They came to an understanding that they would **split the difference** in cost between them.
- 62. **Tumble** to fall quickly and without control She lost her footing and **tumbled** down the stairs.
