- 12. **Lingering** lasting The **lingering** fragrance of the flowers still filled the room.
- 13. Receding fading, going backHe covered his receding hairline with a cap.



14. Suppress - crush

Mothers often **suppress** their own desires but give their children what they need.

- Desire strongly wish for or want something My strongest desire is to do well in my exams.
- Tyrant dictator
 The tyrant's cruelty and suppression led to rebellion by the people.
- Tender showing gentleness
 He was so kind and tender with his sick brother when he was ill.
- Gaudy unpleasantly bright in colour or decoration He did not expect to receive such a gaudy gift.
- Intercepting stopping someone or something before they are able to reach a particular place
 The police have put up blockades and are intercepting all vehicles.
- 20. **Gaze** watch, look The children **gazed** at the firecrackers in astonishment.
- 21. **Still** stop The scared person stood **still** like a statue.
- 22. **Fluttering** moving with a light irregular or trembling motion She complained that her heart was **fluttering** constantly.
- 23. **Flapping** move (wings) up and down when flying or preparing to fly The bird in the cage started **flapping** its wings when the children teased it.
- 24. **Cautionary** warning Cigarette packets are supposed to carry a **cautionary** health message.
- 25. **Gaily** happily The boy hopped around **gaily**.
- 26. **Abreast** alongside The soldiers marching **abreast** at the Republic Day parade are very impressive.
- 27. **Teeming** jam packed The movie hall was **teeming** with teenagers.



- Grove an area covered with trees
 A mango grove provides welcome shade in summers.
- 29. **Gather** collect The child tried to **gather** as many candies as he could.
- Dove a type of bird from the same family as pigeons
 On our way to our hotel, we saw a flock of doves flying high.
- Caper something like singing or dancing, that is done to entertain others or as a joke The young man was entertaining the audience with comic capers.
- 32. **Throngs** crowd A **throng** of police officers surrounded the criminal.
- Converging meeting
 It was hard to enter the Ram Lila grounds because crowds were converging there.
- 34. **Whirlpool** quickly rotating water in the river The **whirlpool** is so strong that it can suck in a large boat.
- Repelled force away Indian soldiers repelled all attempts by terrorists to enter India.
- 36. **Confusion** uncertainty about what is happening, intended, or required During the storm, there was a lot of **confusion** about the departure time of the trains.
- 37. Sweetmeats sweets (candies, cakes, pastries, preserves) used to be called sweetmeats. Today this word is not so commonly used. Indians love to eat sweetmeats after each meal.
- Murmured a low continuous background noise The class fell silent, but as soon as the teacher turned away the murmuring resumed.
- 39. Heeded paid attention toHe always heeded his father's advice.
- 40. **Irresistibly** too attractive and tempting to be resisted I am **irresistibly** drawn to a beautiful painting.



- 41. **Heaped** put objects one over another After the Management Committee meeting was over, all the chairs were **heaped** together in a corner.
- 42. **Overwhelming** having a strong emotional effect His **overwhelming** love for food has made him fat.
- 43. **Possess** own My brother **possesses** a motor cycle.
- 44. **Coiled** arranged in a series of circles The **coiled** wires on top of the wall prevent people jumping into the garden.
- 45. **Invisible** cannot be seen Many stars in the sky are **invisible** to the naked eye.
- 46. **Rippling -** moving in a way that looks like small waves When I threw a stone in the lake, the water started **rippling**.
- 47. Forbidden not allowedHe was forbidden from entering the school.
- 48. **Coarse** rough The **coarse** cloth did not find any buyers.
- 49. Shrieked to make a high pitched noiseThe women shrieked when the robber waved a pistol at them.
- 50. **Intently** with attention Students must listen to the teacher **intently**.
- 51. **Jerk** a quick sharp movement He **jerked** open the zip of the bag and all its contents spilled out.
- 52. **Fierce** very aggressive or angry The **fierce** look on the thief's face scared all of us.
- 53. **Flushed** red and hot, typically as the result of illness or strong emotion Her face **flushed** with excitement when she met her favourite actor.

- 59. **Defeated** lost a battle or argument or game India was **defeated** in the final of the World Cup.
- 60. **Suppressed** forcibly put an end to something The police **suppressed** the rising protests.
- 61. **Sobs** noisy cry, taking in deep breaths He **sobbed** bitterly after his dog got lost.
- 62. Patch a small area that is different in some way from the area that surrounds it There were patches of green among the drying grass.
- 63. **Shrine** holy place The Golden Temple is a famous **shrine** in Amritsar.
- 64. **Congested** crowded The metro was very **congested** yesterday since there was a taxi strike.
- 65. **Jostled** pushed by elbows The fans **jostled** around the cricketers to get their autographs.
- 66. **Hefty** heavy The bank guard was a tall and **hefty** man.
- 67. **Struggled** tried very hard to do something difficult Mohan **struggled** to solve the difficult maths problem.
- 68. **Trampled** crushed The dog **trampled** all the flowers as he ran around the garden.



69. Surging - rising

During the tsunami, the waves were **surging** up to ten feet.

- 70. Steered to control the direction of a vehicle or situationHe steered his motorbike away from the potholes in the road.
- 71. **Bitterly** severely He was **bitterly** hurt by his friend's betrayal.
- 72. **Soothe** calm The mother held her baby tight to **soothe** her during the thunderstorm.
- 73. Shrill a shrill sound is very high, loud, and often unpleasantThe two women were fighting in front of their house in shrill voices.
- 74. **Pleaded** requested He **pleaded** with the audience to turn off their cell phones.
- 75. **Double-pitched strain** loud screams Rohan's **double-pitched strain** demanding an ice-cream could be heard outside the house.
- 76. **Distract** prevent from concentrating on something Nothing can **distract** her once she decides to do something.
- 77. **Persuasively** convincingly He won the debate because he argued **persuasively**, and with great confidence.
- 78. **Bore** carry He **bore** the weight of the box on his shoulder.
- 79. **Reiterated** repeated The teacher **reiterated** his arguments to convince his students that they must stop smoking.
- 80. Humour to do what someone wants so that they do not become upset or annoyed
 I tried to humour the child by pretending to be an elephant with a long trunk.
- 81. **Disconsolate** very unhappy He was **disconsolate** when he saw he had failed his exams.
